

Highly Anticipated Courtyard by Marriott Nanaimo Hotel Opens for Business

Adjacent to the Vancouver Island Conference Centre, the new 172-key business-class hotel invites guests to experience Snuneymuxw art and culture

SNUNEYMUXW TERRITORY (Nanaimo, B.C.) – Snuneymuxw First Nation and PEG Companies ["PEG"] announce the soft opening of Courtyard by Marriott Nanaimo, a highly anticipated 172-key business-class hotel that positions Nanaimo for further growth and honours Snuneymuxw art and culture.

Located at 100 Gordon Street adjacent to the Vancouver Island Conference Centre, the new hotel represents a significant collaborative effort between PEG, the Snuneymuxw First Nation, the City of Nanaimo, and other project partners including Omicron Construction.

"As the majority owner of the hotel, we celebrate the opportunity to share Snuneymuxw culture with visitors from all over the world while supporting the economic growth of our Nation and the local community," says Chief Mike Wyse. "By investing in Nanaimo's hospitality industry, we have created local jobs and established essential infrastructure that benefits a growing tourism sector."

"It's only been three years since we saw the ground break on this project, but for the citizens of Nanaimo, a hotel next to our Vancouver Island Conference Centre has been more than a decade in the making. The City appreciates the confidence PEG and Snuneymuxw First Nation are showing in our economy. With excitement, we welcome the very impressive Courtyard by Marriott; we know this hotel will help us grow our leisure and business tourism markets in a big way," said Nanaimo Mayor Leonard Krog.

PEG was selected to develop the hotel in 2017. The Utah-based firm broke ground in February 2020 just before the COVID-19 pandemic hit, which later created many hurdles for the company to overcome, including labor shortages, elevated construction costs, and travel restrictions. Through diligence and creativity, PEG ultimately pushed through those challenges and is now delivering the upscale hotel they promised to the community.

"Here at PEG, our word is our bond," said Chief Investment Officer Robert Schmidt, who oversaw the entire development and construction process. "We appreciate the great trust the community of Nanaimo placed in us as its development partner of choice, and we learned a lot while persevering through the challenging market conditions and exercising our value engineering capabilities," he explained.

The hotel has the benefit of being located on culturally significant land, where the beloved, and now extinct, Wool Dogs were cared for by the Snuneymuxw People. In recognition of this, the hotel has integrated site-specific Snuneymuxw art throughout its design, including in its guest rooms and public spaces. Ay Lelum The Good House of Design was selected for the project and worked in conjunction with the PEG and Marriot team. The artwork in the hotel is by Joel Good, Dr. William Good, Sandra Moorhouse-Good, Aunalee Boyd-Good, Sophia Seward-Good, and Thea Harris.



"Our goal was to create an immersive and one-of-a-kind experience that celebrates Snuneymuxw culture and the unique history of the land on which the hotel is located," says Aunalee Boyd-Good. "Our family of artists is honoured to share the profound connection between art, place and history with hotel guests."

To construct the nine-story building, PEG partnered with Vancouver-based Nexxi Building Solutions Inc. ["Nexxi"]. Using Nexxi's low-carbon, concrete alternative panels to build the exterior sped up construction time and reduced the climate impact, nearly diminishing the on-site construction waste that traditional builds typically produce.

Hotel Equities, which manages a portfolio of 250-plus hotels and resorts throughout the U.S. and Canada, is operating the property with hospitality veteran Paul Dodds serving as General Manager. So far, fifty-six people have been hired to work in the hotel, many of whom are members of Snuneymuxw First Nation.

With several convention center-related bookings in place and JANT-related business, hotel operations are off to a strong start. PEG plans to host a community-wide ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate construction completion this May.

The Snuneymuxw are a vibrant First Nation of the Coast Salish People, residing in the centre of Coast Salish territory on the eastern coast of Vancouver Island, with villages on the Fraser River and waterways in the Gulf Islands. Snuneymuxw territory encompasses one of the most productive and resource rich areas at the heart of the Salish Sea.

On December 23, 1854, the Snuneymuxw People entered the Snuneymuxw Treaty of 1854 to forever and always preserve and protect Snuneymuxw villages, enclosed fields, waterways, harvesting and gathering, and the rights to hunt and fisheries as formerly. Often referred to as a trade and commerce treaty, the Snuneymuxw Treaty of 1854 is protected under section 35 of the Constitution Act, 1982. 



Women's Summer Internship Program: Marine Spill Response Technician

Who is Eligible?





Wildlife reminder





Snuneymuxw IR# 2,3,4 are surrounded by forested land that is home to a variety of creatures big and small. Predators such as bears and cougars will wonder into residential areas in pursuit of prey. Animal sightings on IR 2,3 and 4 have been low so far, however since the school has been built Mr. Bear has been caught on school surveillance late at night and early mornings.

Parents, please keep an eye on your children playing outside or at the school park afterschool hours.

If you have fruit trees on you property please make sure you discard fruit when it drops, because decaying fruit attracts bears.

Hunters, please bring all deer, elk and bear remains to the mountains. Please bring fish remains back to the river.

Cougars are predatory hunters and prefer to stalk their pray. If you see a cougar:

- Never Run
- If seen, make sure that it knows that you see it and walk back slowly while keeping it in sight
- Make yourself bigger raise your arms above your head or open your jacket wide open.
- Make loud noises while backing up slowly
- Never play dead

Bears are omnivores and will scavenge. They eat anything including fruit, seeds and garbage.

- Never Run
- If seen, make sure that it knows that you see it and walk back slowly while keeping it in sight
- Make yourself bigger ie..holding your arms and or jacket open
- Make Loud noises while backing up slowly
- Never play dead

Please call as soon as you see a cougar or bear. This helps Conservation Officers track their movement.





Who to Contact for Dog Related Issues

The SFN Dog Bylaw will be used as a guideline for these following situations:

- Stray dogs / dogs off-leash
- Aggressive dogs
- Nuisance dogs (i.e. continuous barking, howling)
- Neglect to an extent that is cruel or unnecessary

The process for dog related issues:

- A complaint is received by SFN Infrastructure
- A letter will be written from SFN Infrastructure to the offender in question (the claimant will remain confidential; the person making the complaint). The letter will contain details regarding the incident and will cite directly from the SFN Dog Bylaw.
- The letter will then be hand delivered to the offender in question. If the situation
 warrants the enforcement mechanism via Animal Control (as per the SFN Dog
 Bylaw) then Animal Control will be contacted and / or will deliver the letter to
 the offender themselves in severe circumstances.
- Animal Control enforces the SFN Dog Bylaw as well as other local area animal control bylaws.

- Coping with impact of residential school and day school
- Concerns about your own, or someone else's substance use

If our counsellors determine that you may be better supported by another service provider (for example, someone who specializes in a particular area) they can help you navigate other options.
